Episcopal Church Women (ECW)

Covid restrictions downsized activity the past two years for Episcopal Church Women (ECW) at Christ Church, but the group, which welcomes all women in the parish, is eager to resume activity with dinner meetings in the Spring and never ceased to continue its work. In fact, under the leadership of Patty Richardson, in 2022 ECW provided a Thanksgiving Dinner to the Men's Fellowship Home and made a \$500 donation to the Christmas Fund at the Highland Education Project (HEP). Just before Christmas, several volunteers gathered to continue a popular and long-standing tradition of packing gift boxes with homemade cookies to deliver to shut-ins and friends.

Dinner meetings in the past have included a meal, a short devotion or evening prayer, and a brief business meeting. Activities of ECW include supporting the Church Periodical Club, a ministry providing religious and secular written materials to organizations that cannot otherwise obtain them, and The United Thank Offering.

ECW has refurbished the church nursery and donated children's books for distribution at West Virginia Bridge Day at the New River Gorge. ECW also prepares and delivers meals to sick and homebound parish members.

Minutes of Vestry Meeting January 18, 2023

A regularly scheduled meeting of the Vestry was held in Rowley Hall, beginning at 7:00 p.m.

Senior Warden David Kersey called the meeting to order and declared the presence of a quorum.

Pastor Paul opened the meeting with a devotional from a book authored by President Jimmy Carter.

The minutes of the December 14, 2022 meeting were reviewed and upon motion of Betty Nash and second of Peter Taylor were unanimously approved.

Don Kersey presented the treasurer's report for the period ending December 31, 2022. We received significant unrestricted contributions for the month, some of those being pre-paid pledges for 2023. Those resulted in the church being over budget for the calendar/fiscal year and allowed us to begin 2023 with a significant cash balance. A different format for the P&L to be generated going forward was presented and explained. The balance sheet was reviewed and there were no significant changes in balances. Upon motion of Susanne Pulse and second of Peter Taylor, the financial report was unanimously approved. Don and Vic Bowman then presented the proposed budget for 2023 which assumes income of \$180,000 and expenses of \$214,000, leaving a deficit of over \$30,000. It is not uncommon to have deficit budgets and, nevertheless, historically the church has not had difficulty paying its bills. Don pointed out that we are starting the year with enough cash to offset the deficit, so we are presently secure financially. Upon motion of Betty Nash and second of Linda Ammar, the budget was unanimously approved and will be presented to the congregation at the annual meeting this Sunday.

David Kersey gave the Senior Warden report. All requirements of the Eli Lilly sabbatical grant have been met and approved by the foundation and the remaining funds left in our account have been returned to and received by Eli Lilly. David gave Canon Chad Slater all the credit for completing the necessary paperwork. To fill the Vestry positions being vacated by David Kersey, Linda Ammar and Elizabeth Clement, Mimi Merritt, Becky Beckett and Don Kersey have agreed to stand for election at this Sunday's annual Meeting. Susanne Pulse and Mimi Merritt have agreed to be convention delegates, with Rob Merritt and Jim Pulse serving as alternates. Peter Richardson gave the Junior Warden report. A leak in the narthex roof has been repaired. A new hot water heater was purchased and installed.

Susanne Pulse gave the Communications report. The Rainbow for January was published on time and the weekly emails are continuing to be distributed.

Linda Ammar gave the Parish Life report. She thanked the vestry for hosting the farewell reception for Rev. Lou Hays. Becky and John Beckett hosted the December Canterbury Club and Linda Thomas hosted the January Canterbury Club. She thanked them for opening their homes to the church members and guests.

Peter Taylor gave the Outreach report. Food Pantry will be held tomorrow, January 19 from 9:00 to 11:00. Kerosene vouchers will be distributed and approximately 60 people will be expected. It is not clear that there are that many attendees are using kerosene for heat, compared to the number of vouchers being distributed. For next season, we should consider giving food gift cards instead of kerosene vouchers.

Paul gave the Pastor's report. He began by thanking the Vestry for its hard work during this past transitional year, leading us to this point and calling him as Pastor. The Bishop has called a diocesan staff meeting for February 27 and 28 and March 1, in Frederick, Maryland, so he will be gone those days. He will attend his daughter's college graduation on April 22-24, so we will have to have cover for that Sunday. His regular office hours will be Tuesday-Thursday, 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. His off days will be Friday and Saturday. His Sunday hours will be 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Mondays will be his day for H.E.P.

Paul will put together a written Rector's Report for the Annual Meeting package, reflecting the statistics of worship and attendance for 2022.

On Wednesday's Paul will host Chapel live on Facebook from St. Margaret's Chapel, and Russ Hatfield is expected to participate.

Paul expressed his appreciation that the congregation is willing to wear nametags on Sunday, to help him, but because of his familiarity with the congregation, he does not think we need name tags. The Vestry deferred to Paul's preference.

New Business-Peter Richardson reported his understanding that some of the telephones in the church are inoperable. Vic Bowman volunteered that he and Don would look into that.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned upon motion of Vic Bowman and closed with a prayer by Paul.

Sideline Smokies – Submitted by Becky Kersey (recipe from Betty Crocker)

1 (16 oz) pound of bacon 1 (14 oz) package of little smokie sausages 1 cup of brown sugar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Cut bacon into thirds

Wrap 1/3 of each bacon slice around a smokie and secure with a toothpick

Place in a glass baking dish or a jellyroll pan lined with foil. Sprinkle brown sugar on top of each smokie.

Bake 40-45 minutes. Serve immediately or keep warm in slow cooker.
