

What is world communion Sunday?

World Communion Sunday is a celebration observed by several Christian denominations, taking place on the first Sunday of every October, that promotes Christian unity and ecumenical cooperation. It focuses on an observance of the eucharist. The tradition was begun in 1933 by Hugh Thomson Kerr who ministered in the Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.



It was his desire to bring churches together in a service of Christian unity—in which everyone might receive both inspiration and information, and above all, to know how important the Church of Jesus Christ is, and how each congregation is interconnected one with another.



Who was St. Francis of Assisi?

Francis, the son of a prosperous merchant of Assisi, was born in 1182. His early youth was spent in harmless revelry and fruitless attempts to win military glory. Various encounters with beggars and lepers affected the young man's conscience, and he decided to embrace a life devoted to Lady Poverty. Despite his father's intense opposition, Francis totally renounced all material values, and devoted himself to serve the poor. In 1210, Pope Innocent III confirmed the simple Rule for the Order of Friars Minor, a name Francis chose to emphasize his desire to be numbered among the "least" of God's servants.

The Order grew rapidly all over Europe. By 1221, however, Francis had lost control of it since his ideal of strict and absolute poverty, both for the individual friars and for the Order as a whole, was found to be too difficult to maintain. His last years were spent in much suffering of body and spirit but his unconquerable joy never failed. Not long before his death, at a retreat on Mt. La Verna, Francis received, on September 14, Holy Cross Day, the marks of the Lord's wounds, the stigmata, in his own hands and feet and side. Pope Gregory IX, a former patron of the Franciscans, canonized Francis in 1228, and began erection of the great basilica in Assisi where Francis is buried.

Of all the saints, Francis is the most popular and admired, but probably the least imitated; few have attained to his total identification with the poverty and suffering of the Christ. He is especially remembered for his humble love of all of God's living things.

Why do we celebrate them together today?

This year both feasts fall on the same day—October 4th. Now, more than ever, we should strive to work together as neighbors, friends, and stewards of creation for the common good of our world.



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



THE FIRST LESSON

The First Lesson is from the 1st chapter of the Book of Genesis.

THE GOSPEL LESSON



The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the 17th chapter



After Jesus had spoken these words, he looked up to heaven and said, 'Father, the hour has come; glorify your Son so that the Son may glorify you, since you have given him authority over all people, to give eternal life to all whom you have given him. And this is eternal life, that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent. I glorified you on earth by finishing the work that you gave me to do. So now, Father, glorify me in your own presence with the glory that I had in your presence before the world existed.

I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them. And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one. While I was with them, I protected them in your name that you have given me. I guarded them, and not one of them was lost


except the one destined to be lost, so that the scripture might be fulfilled. But now I am coming to you, and I speak these things in the world so that they may have my joy made complete in themselves. I have given them your word, and the world has hated them because they do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. I am not asking you to take them out of the world, but I ask you to protect them from the evil one. They do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth. As you have sent me into the world, so I have sent them into the world. And for their sakes I sanctify myself, so that they also may be sanctified in truth.

'I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. The glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me. Father, I desire that those also, whom you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory, which you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world.

'Righteous Father, the world does not know you, but I know you; and these know that you have sent me. I made your name known to them, and I will make it known, so that the love with which you have loved me may be in them, and I in them.'

In Europe, Christians came together in cathedrals and in storefronts, worshiping in multiple languages with long-time neighbors and refugees who have just arrived at their new homes. In Africa, the sacrament was celebrated in great numbers by the faithful.

In well-dressed sanctuaries and in simple tents, the Spirit of the Lord is pleased to dwell today with all who gather to share the sign and seal of grace. And now it is our turn.


This table is for all of us, near and far, high and low, east and west and north and south.

This is the Lord's table. This is a table of grace.


So come and take your place at the feast of grace.

You are welcome, you are invited, you are called: Come, let us share this feast together.




THE PRAYER OF THE HOLY EUCHARIST

THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE HOLY EUCHARIST & BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS

The receipt of the Bread and Cup, which is the Communion of the body and the blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, in the sacrament of the Holy Eucharist, is an outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace. In as much as you listening at home would like to partake of this holy food, the spiritual grace provided by the same is supplied to you.

In union, O Lord, with your faithful people at every altar of your Church, where the Holy Eucharist is now being celebrated, I desire to offer to you praise and thanksgiving. I remember your death, Lord Christ; I proclaim your resurrection; I await your coming in glory. And since I cannot receive you today in the Sacrament of your Body and Blood, I beseech you to come spiritually into my heart. Cleanse and strengthen me with your grace, Lord Jesus, and let me never be separated from you. May I live in you, and you in me, in this life and in the life to come. Amen.

At this time all are welcome to come forward for the receipt of the elements of the Holy Eucharist, either in both kinds or by Bread only.

Please form a socially distanced single line. After you have received the Bread you may turn to either side as may be most convenient for you to take an individual serving of the Cup. After partaking of the Sacrament you may place the serving cup in the separate receiving plate.

Pastor Maggie and Father Chad will be on separate sides for you to bring your animal, or a photo of your pet, for a blessing. If your pet is here, but you are not able to bring it forward with you, please let one of them know.

Our collection today is designated to go to the Bluefield Union Mission. The Union Mission is an ecumenical ministry founded over 80 years ago, in part, by our three churches. Baskets to receive the offering are located near the altar.



POST-COMMUNION PRAYER


