Confession of Sin

The Officiant says to the people

We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

The Priest alone stands and says

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep vou in eternal life. Amen.

The Lessons

A reading from the Book of the Prophet IsaiahIsaiah 40:21-31Have you not known? Have you not heard?Has it not been told you from the beginning?Have you not understood from the foundations of the earth?It is he who sits above the circle of the earth,and its inhabitants are like grasshoppers;who stretches out the heavens like a curtain,and spreads them like a tent to live in;who brings princes to naught,and makes the rulers of the earth as nothing.Scarcely are they planted, scarcely sown,scarcely has their stem taken root in the earth,when he blows upon them, and they wither,and the tempest carries them off like stubble.It is stubble.

To whom then will you compare me, or who is my equal? says the Holy One. Lift up your eyes on high and see: Who created these? He who brings out their host and numbers them, calling them all by name; because he is great in strength, mighty in power, not one is missing. Why do you say, O Jacob, and speak, O Israel, "My way is hidden from the Lord, and my right is disregarded by my God"? Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable. He gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless. Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted; but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.

A Reading from Paul's First Letter to the Church in Corinth 1 Corinthians 9:16-23

If I proclaim the gospel, this gives me no ground for boasting, for an obligation is laid on me, and woe to me if I do not proclaim the gospel! For if I do this of my own will, I have a reward; but if not of my own will, I am entrusted with a commission. What then is my reward? Just this: that in my proclamation I may make the gospel free of charge, so as not to make full use of my rights in the gospel.

For though I am free with respect to all, I have made myself a slave to all, so that I might win more of them. To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews. To those under the law I became as one under the law (though I myself am not under the law) so that I might win those under the law. To those outside the law I became as one outside the law (though I am not free from God's law but am under Christ's law) so that I might win those outside the law. To the weak I became weak, so that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people, that I might by all means save some. I do it all for the sake of the gospel, so that I may share in its blessings.


A Reading from the Gospel of Mark

Mark 1:29-39

After Jesus and his disciples left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told him about her at once. He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them.

That evening, at sundown, they brought to him all who were sick or possessed with demons. And the whole city was gathered around the door. And he cured many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons; and he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him. In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. And Simon and his companions hunted for him. When they found him, they said to him, "Everyone is searching for you." He answered, "Let us go on to the neighboring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came out to do." And he went throughout Galilee, proclaiming the message in their synagogues and casting out demons.

Lenten Project: From Worship & Spirituality Chair, Alyson Bowling:

It is at this time I would like to ask each of you to reflect and write about your experiences over the past year and how those experiences have impacted your lives. You can write anonymously or sign your story. The important thing here is to begin reconnecting with one another in hopes and anticipation for renewed in-person fellowship among our congregation. But even if that experience continues to be postponed, we can still have our stories to bring us closer at a time when it is entirely to easy to separate ourselves from the needs of others and fall short of the glory of God.

The guidelines for this writing are simple. Reflect and Journal your Covid year experience over the next weeks and conclude your writing with how this experience has impacted your faith. How has your faith been affected? Have you lost faith, gained faith or both. Have you experienced a renewed purpose you may not have seen without the Covid struggle? The length of your manuscript is not important. Write as much or as little as you like. Sign your name or remain anonymous.

We will put together a desktop publication for distribution among our congregation. Please submitted your writing by March 1 so that we can distribute by mid-March and have you reconnecting for Easter, April 4, 2021.
